SCOTT COUNTY PARKS ADVISORY COMMISSION MEETING MINUTES August 12, 2020

The Scott County Parks Advisory Commission held their August meeting on August 12, 2020 at the Cedar Lake Farm Regional Park Picnic Shelter at 25875 Juniper Ave, New Prague, MN 56071. Staff members present were Patty Freeman, General Manager of Scott County Parks and Trails, Nathan Moe, Parks Planner, Alysa Delgado, Parks and Natural Resources Coordinator.

 Roll Call: Chair Mark Ewert called the meeting to order at 6:02 PM and proceeded with the roll call. Members Present: Kristin French, Kathy Gerlach, Jerry Hennen, Eric Spieler, Patrick Stieg, Barb Hedstrom and Mark Ewert.

Members Absent: Commissioner Jon Ulrich

- 2) The Pledge of Allegiance followed roll call.
- 3) Approval of Agenda

Motion by Commissioner Ewert second by Commissioner Hedstrom to approve the agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

4) Approval of meeting minutes for 06/24/20

Motion by Commissioner Ewert second by Commissioner Gerlach to approve the 06/24/20 meeting minutes as written. The motion carried unanimously.

- 5) Recognition of Interested Citizens for Items Not on Agenda
- No citizen comments.
- 6) Administration, Planning, and Development
 - a. Covid-19 Operations Update
 - Parks and regional trails are open
 - Boat rentals are open via online reservation.
 - Golf courses are open.
 - Golf lessons, summer programs and summer camps are getting underway.
 - Swim beaches are open.
 - Play areas open.
 - Hyland, French and Cleary visitor centers open providing basic guest services and additional restrooms.
 - Campgrounds and group camps are open.
 - Picnic shelter reservations available.
 - Staff reminded commissioners that the Three Rivers Park District website is the most up-to-date information regarding Covid-19 updates

- Commissioner Ewert asked if public restrooms are open. Staff responded that around 80% of them are, but to check the website for park specifics.
- Patty reminded commissioners that staff are primarily working from home at the moment
- Patty provided updates from Tom Balk, Parks Operations Supervisor, on impacts to golf, camping, and boat rentals. Overall, golf tee times and the driving range are having record breaking years.
- Commissioner Hennen commented that the numbers for golf are great especially since we have had a very hot summer. He asked if the revenue is up because TRPD changed fee prices? Staff responded NO.
- Commissioner Spieler mentioned that at Cleary some of the Social Distancing signs have been damaged, but that he has noticed an increase in mask use from staff.

b. 2020 County Budget Update

- Early measures helped
- Hiring freeze, heavy limits on spending, cross function support
- Golf operations revenue critical
- Budget report through May, a lot of unknowns, but projects has us close to balanced
- Second quarter budget report coming in a few weeks

Proposed 2021 Budget - Status

- \$804,362 in proposed reductions to division budgets across Scott County
- \$116,877 in proposed reductions to discretionary services (outside partners)
- \$1,708,615 Maximum Fund Balance Usage
- \$658,769 in *yet to identify* reductions (on-going or one-time)
- New Growth: 1.92% Levy Increase \$3.25M in reductions and fund balance
- On-Going reductions target at \$1.7M
- New Growth + Inflation: 2.52% Levy Increase \$2.83M in reductions and fund balance
- On-Going reductions target at \$1.5M

Parks Partnership Budget

- Direction from Park District and County leadership to find savings, look at operational changes within the partnership as means of lowering expenses in 2021 operating budget
- Managers are reviewing/analyzing
- Targeting \$50,000 to \$75,000 reduction/savings
- Continued conversation about savings through 2021 for the 2022 budget
- Changing revenue structures not supported at this point; stay the course
- Patty asked Commissioners if Parks was doing anything well or are there things of concern to pass along to the board for final discussion on funding? Commissioner French indicated that Parks has worked to keep the delicate balance of acquiring, maintaining, and improving parklands and has been successful for over a decade now. Commissioner Hedstrom commented that when money gets spent on projects, the perception is that it is often at a higher cost to match the level of excellence that has been previously established by Three Rivers. She noted it is helpful when staff explores cost reduction options and alternatives whenever possible and include the results of these explorations in presentation to the PAC, like what staff did with the regional trail wayfinding kiosks. She indicated that in the future SC could loop in the local community more from a finance perspective to keep costs local and low.
- Commissioner Ewert asked if budget conversations were on the fiscal year or the calendar year?
 Patty indicated fiscal.

- Commissioner Ewert expressed that he feels the pace of doing what we say we are going to do
 in our master plans is way too slow. Patty commented that a consideration to remember is that
 master plans are intended to guide development over a 10 to 20 year timeframe.
- Commissioner Spieler mentions a missed opportunity to fund raise for the parks during peak
 visitation times earlier this summer. Commissioner Hedstrom asked if the County would commit
 to raising more money for the parks?

c. Cleary Master Plan

- Patty indicates that Master Planning for Cleary Lake Regional Park is critical to update some amenities and because of grant timelines
- Commissioner Ewert asked what the traditional costs of Master Planning are (not in a pandemic). Patty responded between \$60-100k, but it varies. Commissioner Ewert followed up with a question about the traditional length of a Master Plan. Patty responded approximately 12 months
- To kick off Cleary Master plan, staff will:
 - Design a process with accommodations and means to mitigate
 - Stresses in community
 - Gathering limitations
 - Vulnerable populations
 - Risk of participants, staff becoming unavailable
 - Have multiple back up timeline scenarios
 - Back up project leads and technical resources
 - Learn and use new engagement techniques Social Pinpoint
- Staff shared lessons learned about master planning in a pandemic from Three Rivers Park District, Minneapolis Parks, and St. Paul Parks.
- No concerns were brought up by the PAC regarding master planning during a pandemic.

The purpose of this agenda item is for PAC discussion and feedback on staff's proposal for the Cleary Lake Master Plan team approach and plan kick off events.

Background

Master Planning Teams

Scott County's approach to regional park and trail master planning has until recently been unique amongst our regional park peers in the extent of resident engagement integrated at all levels of the planning process. It is just in the last couple of years that other agencies have begun inviting the level of resident participation the County has set as a standard over the past decade in its regional park and trail planning.

In our five most recent master planning efforts we formed a Citizen Design Team or "CDT" made up entirely of residents, and this group with support from three key staff and a consultant team, guided the creation of the master plan concepts. We did not identify a separate project or technical support team. This model worked very well in engaging our policy makers, generating community interest, and framing issues and goals from grass roots input. This also resulted in a large group of individuals across the county who remained engaged in county plans, issues, projects, etc. A challenge of the model was a lack of consistent administrative, communications and technical supports for the duration of the project.

For the Cleary Lake Regional Park master plan, staff envisions two planning teams; a technical team consisting of staff and consultants that would support and be a part of a larger Resident Design Team. The Resident Design Team would consist of residents from Scott County and the region, park users and non-park users, and individuals from under-represented groups, along with the technical team.

The PAC is asked to discuss and provide feedback for staff. PAC members are also asked if they would like to assist with the kickoff events.
